After a flood

If you are unfortunate enough to be affected by a flood, there are a number of things to be aware of when clearing up:

- **?** Ring your insurance company and register your claim.
- ? Take photos or videos and make a list of everything that has been damaged.
- Plood water could be contaminated or contain sharp objects so always wear protective clothing, boots and rubber gloves when cleaning up.
- Find out how to dispose of flood damaged items safely, after you have spoken to your insurance company.
- ? Get your electricity checked by a qualified electrician before you turn it back on.

Beware of rogue traders

If your property has been damaged, don't be tempted to agree to have work done by someone who appears at your door unannounced. Always use reputable building contractors and do not pay in advance. Find a trader using the County Council's Buy with Confidence scheme **www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk**

Flooding can happen anywhere - are you prepared?

One in six properties in England is at risk from flooding. Heavy rain has had a devastating impact where people have had to leave their homes and seen valuables destroyed by flood water.

How to prepare for a flood

There are things you can do to reduce the impact of flooding by preparing in advance, such as:

- \checkmark Have the correct home insurance policy in place.
- Write a simple plan of how you would respond to a flood - include emergency contact numbers, essential documents, medication and belongings you would need if you had to evacuate.
- Prepare an emergency flood kit with items you may need if flooding means you can't access your house.
- Keep your drains and gutters clear of leaves to help prevent blockages and localised flooding in heavy rainfall.
- Make sure you know how to quickly turn off your water, gas and electricity mains.
- Buying sandbags or other flood protection products might help but check government advice about how best to protect your home

What to do during a flood

Flood water can rise quickly, so always focus on the safety of yourself and your family before your property and be prepared to act quickly. **If there is an immediate risk to life or you are trapped by flood water call 999.**

In the event of an emergency or severe flooding, follow these steps to stay safe:

Move your family and pets upstairs, or to a high place with a means of escape.

Move important items and documents upstairs or somewhere high and safe.

Turn off gas, electricity and water supplies if flood water is about to enter your home.

DO NOT touch any electrical appliances or cables when standing in flood water.

If you are asked to evacuate your home, first contact your insurance provider or landlord (if renting) as they may be able to provide you with temporary accommodation. If you are uninsured or your landlord isn't able to help, contact your friends and family to see whether they can help. If you are unable to find alternative accommodation you can contact West Oxfordshire District Council on **01993 861000** for assistance.

Avoid walking or driving through flood water.
